

BRITISH LAWS:

In the main the UK is a very safe place to live where the laws are upheld. Certainly it is one of the few countries in the world where the police do not usually carry guns. But, like every country, we have some problems. The following information may be helpful.

PREVENTING and REPORTING CRIMES:

RACIAL, XENOPHOBIC and HOMOPHOBIC CRIMES:

If someone is attacked, or shouted at, or property is damaged because of that person's race, religion, nationality or sexual orientation, this is a 'hate' incident. The police need you to report this. It is not acceptable in this country, and the police will help to find and punish people who carry out hate crimes. If you become a victim of any crime please report this to the police. The matter will be investigated particularly in cases of victimisation where you may have been seen to be a member of a minority group. As well as patrol officers, each neighbourhood has a designated police officer. They are able to offer you any help or advice you need. Do not take the law into your own hands because you may end up getting yourself into trouble or hurt.

WEAPONS CRIMES:

You cannot carry weapons in a public place, not even for personal protection. This includes guns and knives as well as other weapons. Pocket knives must have a blade less than 3 inches (7.5cm) and any weapon where the blade locks in place is not permitted, whatever the blade length. Pepper spray/CS gas is classed as a firearm in the UK and cannot be legally carried by members of the public. There is now an automatic 5 year prison sentence for anyone convicted of carrying a gun (or asking a young person to carry it for them).

SEX – The AGE of CONSENT:

It is illegal to have sex before you are 16, or with someone who is under 16. It is illegal to have sex with someone who doesn't want to have sex with you. It is called rape if you do, and this is a major crime. Your partner cannot force you to have sex with them if you don't want to, even in your own home. This is still rape.

DRINK:

It is illegal to drink alcohol in a pub before you are 18. There are also serious penalties for any adult who buys alcohol to give to a young person, or who gives drink to a young person – even at home. Anybody drinking and driving faces a long ban and a possible prison sentence.

DRUGS:

It is illegal to take or deal in illegal drugs, such as heroin, cocaine, marijuana and ecstasy. The penalties for dealing in drugs can be very high, including not only lengthy imprisonment but also seizure of possessions and money in bank accounts. Anybody using drugs and driving faces a long ban and a possible prison sentence.

BRIBERY:

It is illegal to try to bribe a police officer. And, in the UK, because the police force is very

professional, most attempts at bribery will be reported with serious consequences.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE and ABUSE:

If a woman, man or child is attacked by a relative, a partner or ex-partner, this is called 'domestic abuse' or 'domestic violence'. Neither is acceptable in the UK. Anybody who feels under threat, or is abused in their own home, can contact the police in emergency. There are also organizations including Victim Support and women's refuges which operate 24-hour help-lines. They give emotional support and legal advice to people suffering domestic abuse. They also offer counseling (talking to both parties to find a solution).

The women's refuges have places for women (and any children) to go to if they have to leave home because of domestic abuse. The local authorities and the Department of Health – see www.dh.gov.uk/en/SocialCare/index.htm - can also provide houses for victims.
